FC Shakhtar Donetsk v AS Roma MATCH PRESS KIT RSC Olympiyskiy Stadium, Donetsk Wednesday, 22 November 2006 - 20:45CET Group D - Matchday 5



FC Shakhtar Donetsk have only a faint prospect of UEFA Champions League progress but for AS Roma a place in the last 16 is clearly in sight when they visit Ukraine on Matchday 5. With a five-point lead over both Olympiacos CFP and Shakhtar in Group D, second-placed Roma can guarantee their place in the first knockout round with a draw. As for Shakhtar, anything but three points will leave them out of the running.

- Luciano Spalletti's men could have completed the job of qualifying with a home win over Olympiacos on 31 October but instead had to battle back to claim a point. Captain Francesco Totti struck after 66 minutes to cancel out Júlio César's 19th-minute opener for the Greek champions.
- Shakhtar gave group leaders Valencia a scare in a 2-2 draw at the RSC Olympiyskiy Stadium on the same night. Mircea Lucescu's men took a second-minute lead through Jadson and after Fernando Morientes equalised, Fernandinho restored the hosts' lead on 28 minutes. Unfortunately for Shakhtar, Roberto Ayala's 68th-minute header denied them all three points.

Roma rampant

- Shakhtar's failure to beat Valencia meant they stayed bottom with two points, beneath Olympiacos on goal difference. They have been bottom ever since losing 4-0 at Roma on Matchday 1. Shakhtar fell apart after Taddei's 67th-minute opener for Roma, conceding further goals through Totti (76), Daniele De Rossi (79) and David Pizarro (89).
- For Shakhtar, Matchdays 2 and 3 brought a 2-2 home draw with Olympiacos and 2-0 loss at Valencia. Roma lost 2-1 at Valencia before earning a first UEFA Champions League away win in five attempts, 1-0 at Olympiacos.
- Shakhtar's only win in eleven previous games against Italian opposition was in the 1976/77 UEFA Cup third round when they beat Juventus 1-0 in Donetsk. However, it was not enough to overturn a 3-0 first-leg reverse.

Past defeats for Shakhtar

- Since beating Juventus, Shakhtar have lost four successive home games against Italian teams, including a 2-0 home defeat by FC Internazionale Milano in last season's UEFA Champions League third qualifying round.
- Roma went down 2-0 to FC Dynamo Kyiv on their only previous visit to Ukraine in the 2004/05 UEFA Champions League group stage. Giallorossi defender Traianos Dellas headed into his own net after 72 minutes before Maksim Shatskikh doubled the lead ten minutes later.
- Six players from the two squads were on the field during the Italy-Ukraine FIFA World Cup quarter-final in June Roma's Simone Perrotta and Francesco Totti, and Shakhtar's Olexiy Bielik, Viacheslav Sviderskiy, Anatoliy Tymoschuk and Andriy Vorobey.

UEFA club competition milestones

- Shakhtar did not make their debut in European club football's premier competition until the 2000/01 season but their first season ranks as their equal best effort as they reached the group stage. There they famously defeated Arsenal FC 3-0 a result that was not enough to secure qualification but ranks as one of the club's best.
- A 6-3 aggregate win against Club Brugge KV in the third qualifying round guaranteed a return to the group stage four years later. As before they were eliminated with two wins but they were memorable ones as Shakhtar defeated Celtic FC 3-0 and FC Barcelona 2-0.

Ten-year record (including current season)

• Shakhtar's consecutive participations in UEFA club competitions stands at nine seasons. Excluding the 2006/07 season, their involvement has ended with a spell in the UEFA Cup, their best performance coming in 2004/05 when they reached the round of 16 stage. They qualified for this season's group stage by defeating Legia Warszawa 4-2 on aggregate in the third qualifying round.

2005/06 season

Domestic record: Shahktar won their third Ukrainian title in dramatic style as a playoff was needed to separate the defending champions and FC Dynamo Kyiv. Both ending the season with 75 points, and only one loss each from 30 games, the sides met in a one-off decider in Krivoy Rog with Shahktar emerging 2-1 winners thanks to an extra-time winning goal from Julius Aghahowa.

European record: The Ukrainian champions were eliminated at the third qualifying round stage of the UEFA Champions League, losing 3-1 on aggregate against FC Internazionale Milano. Transferring to the UEFA Cup a crushing 6-1 victory against Debrecen VSC put Shakhtar into the group stage where they qualified in second for the loss of only one game. However a 3-2 defeat over two legs at the hands of LOSC Lille Métropole in the Round of 32 ended the run.

- Shakhtar have played 16 games in the UEFA Champions League (group stage to final only), winning four, drawing two and losing ten. They have scored 19 goals and conceded 34.
- The Ukrainian side have played in 38 European Champion Clubs' Cup with 15 wins, seven draws, 16 losses, 56 goals scored and 58 conceded.

• Overall, they have played 100 matches in UEFA club competition, winning 43, drawing 17 and losing 40. In that time, they have scored 146 goals while they have conceded 147 times.

UEFA club competition milestones

- This is Roma's 23nd season in UEFA club competition following their introduction in the 1969/70 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup at the first round stage. They have twice appeared in UEFA finals the 1983/84 European Champion Clubs' Cup and the 1990/91 UEFA Cup.
- In the former, the Italian side were denied victory in a penalty shoot-out in their own Stadio Olimpico by Liverpool FC after the two sides drew 1-1 after 120 minutes. Seven years later, Roma met FC Internazionale Milano in the UEFA Cup final, but again ended on the losing side, 2-1 on aggregate

2005/06 season

Domestic record: Roma enjoyed a strong finish to the Serie A season and finished fifth at the end of the campaign. The subsequent Italian sporting fraud investigation saw Roma moved up to second behind FC Internazionale Milano, at the expense of Juventus, AC Milan and ACF Fiorentina. That was enough to earn them a direct entry to the UEFA Champions League group stage. They lost the Coppa Italia final 4-2 on aggregate to Inter.

European record: Roma entered the 2005/06 UEFA Cup as losing Coppa Italia finalists. They accounted for Aris Thessaloniki FC in the first round, before beating Tromsø IL, drawing with RC Strasbourg and losing against FK Crvena Zvezda. The 3-1 win on the final matchday against FC Basel 1893 took Roma through. They dispatched Club Brugge KV 4-2 on aggregate to qualify for the last 16 but then lost 2-1 in the Round of 16 to eventual finalists Middlesbrough FC.

- To date, Roma have played 166 matches in UEFA competition. The majority of those matches have come in the UEFA Cup where Roma have played 94 times with 52 wins, 14 draws and 28 losses. In that time, the Italian side have scored 150 times with 82 goals conceded. Overall, their record reads: played 166, won 77, drawn 38, lost 51 with 231 goals scored and 154 conceded.
- The club have played 43 times in the European Champion Clubs' Cup, with 13 wins, 15 draws and 15 defeats. They have scored 47 goals and conceded 48.
- In the UEFA Champions League (group stage to final only), Roma have played 34 times with eight wins, 14 draws, 12 defeats, 33 goals scored and 41 conceded.

Match facts

Shakhtar

- The Matchday 4 game against Valencia was the 100th match for Shakhtar in UEFA competition. They have won 43 times with 40 defeats and 17 draws to their name, and by the end of the group stage they will have appeared in the same number of European Champion Clubs' Cup matches and UEFA Cup games 40.
- Although only 25, **Tomáš Hübschman** is the most experienced man in the Shakhtar squad in the competition having made his 26th UEFA Champions League appearance against Valencia on Matchday 4. That was the defender's 51st match in UEFA club competition.
- **Igor Duljaj** made his 60th UEFA club competition appearance against Valencia in Donetsk after missing out at Mestalla while **Olexiy Bielik** and **Matuzalem** are one short of 30 matches in Europe.
- Nine Shakhtar players have appeared in the UEFA Champions League for the first time this season: **Stipe Pletikosa**, **Dmytro Shutkov**, **Bohdan Shust**, **Leonardo**, **Vyacheslav Sviderskiy**, **Fernandinho**, **Olexiy Gay**, **Elano Blumer** and **Jadson Rodriguez**, although all had previously appeared in UEFA club competition.
- Ciprian Marica and Mautzalem have both had five shots wide so far, seven fewer than Boubacar Sanogo.
- **Brandão** has committed 13 fouls, with Florent Malouda having been penalised 17 times, the most. **Fernandinho** has been pulled up for infringements on ten occasions.
- Matuzalem has been impeded ten times, four fewer than Ronaldinho and Shunsuke Nakamura.
- Shakhtar have committed the most fouls in this season's UEFA Champions League having been penalised 87 times.
- The Ukrainian side have also collected 16 yellow cards, the most in the competition. **Anatoliy Tymoschuk** and **Hübschman** have both been booked three times and the latter is suspended against Roma.
- Only PFC Levski Sofia and FC Dynamo Kyiv, with 13 goals each, have conceded more than Shakhtar's total of ten.
- Emmanuel Okoduwa turns 23 on 21 November while Andriy Vorobey is 28 eight days later.
- Last week, Shakhtar coach **Lucescu** and midfielder **Darijo Srna** were given three-match domestic bans following incidents in 1-0 defeat by FC Dynamo Kyiv on 6 November, in which **Dmytro Chygrynskiy** also earned a one-match suspension for his dismissal.
- Shakhtar were 3-0 winners at FC Metalurh Zaporizhya on Saturday but remain four points adrift of Ukrainian Premier League leaders Dynamo. Brazilian forward **Brandão** was the hero for Shakhtar scoring all three goals, but owed each to assists from **Fernandinho**. Brandão broke the deadlock in the 25th minute with a header before adding a second in similar fashion five minutes after the interval. He completed his hat-trick with a low shot in added time. **Lucescu** was in the stands and **Srna** missed out because of their suspensions. **Zvonimir Vukić** filled in for the injured Matuzalem, while **Elano** and **Hübschman** were rested.
- Assistant coach **Olexandr Spiridon** said: "We controlled the game well. After the first goal we gave back the initiative and Metalurh created several half-chances. After the break we scored another quick goal and the final result reflects the game. We could have scored even more as we always felt the support of Mircea Lucescu, who was in the stands right behind us."

- It was the club's second clean sheet in a row. Shakhtar have the best goals against record in the division with just six conceded in their 15 games.
- **Brandão** has now scored six goals in eight league games this season. Five of those strikes have come in the last four matches. His other goal came on the opening day of the season in the 5-0 home defeat of FC Kryvbas Kryvyi Rih on 23 July.
- **Brandão**, who has yet to register in this season's UEFA Champions League, had not struck more than one goal in a league match since scoring twice in a 3-0 defeat of FK Kharkiv on 5 December 2005.
- Fernandinho is the only Shakhtar player to have featured in all of the club's first 15 league games this season.
- Missing at the weekend was Matuzalem, after the Brazilian tore a thigh muscle during the 1-0 defeat by Dynamo.
- The weekend victory came seven days after a 2-0 home success against FC Chornomorets Odesa but the club's championship hopes have been severely dented by that reverse at the hands of Dynamo, which came six days after the 2-2 draw against Valencia on Matchday 4 of the UEFA Champions League.
- On 11 November, Shakhtar were comfortable winners against Chornomorets. **Bielik** scored his seventh league goal of the season and **Jadson** struck before half-time to complete the scoring. It was an eventful match for Jadson as he was sent off in the second half for violent conduct. **Gay** played at right-back with Leonardo in the centre. **Bielik** and **Vorobey** started up front, with **Elano**, **Julius Aghahowa** and **Emmanuel Okoduwa** appearing as second-half substitutes.
- Lucescu said: "It was important for us to gain three points today. When preparing for this match, we underlined the need for a result rather than good football. After the match with Dynamo we needed to get the team back to their usual level of confidence. This is why some of the players who battled against Dynamo were left out."
- The Dynamo defeat initially allowed Shakhtar's fiercest rivals to open up a six-point lead at the summit. The only goal came in the 76th minute from Maksim Shatskikh. Lucescu had begun the game with virtually a full-strength squad, with **Marica** and **Brandão** in attack, the latter missing two good opportunities. **Chygrynskiy**'s red card forced a rethink while **Matuzalem**'s injury gave a chance to **Fernandinho**. **Srna**'s marching orders came after the final whistle for dissent, not long after **Lucescu** was sent to the stands.
- Lucescu said: "It was an even match and we defended quite well until the moment Dynamo scored. Shatskikh took his goal very well. On our side, Brandão had chances but could not take them. I don't think either of the teams deserved the three points, but Dynamo won. Of course I am unhappy about how we played."
- **Srna** was back in action for Croatia on a busy night of international action last Wednesday. He played for 87 minutes as Croatia were 4-3 winners against Israel in their UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifier that allowed them to take top spot in Group E. Club-mate **Pletikosa** did not travel to Tel-Aviv because of a stomach bug.
- Mariusz Lewandowski played no part in Poland's 1-0 qualifying win against Belgium that kept them in contention in Group A.
- **Marica** scored the only goal of the game just before the hour as Romania defeated Spain 1-0 in a friendly in Cadiz. The goal was made in Donetsk as club colleague **Razvan Rat** supplied the assist.
- **Elano** played the whole match as Brazil were 2-1 winners against Switzerland in Basle, supplying the opening goal for Luisão.
- Midfielder Igor Duljaj was rested by Serbia coach Javier Clemente in the 1-1 friendly draw against Norway.

- Chygrynskiy played for Ukraine's Under-21 side as they were 3-1 friendly winners against Uzbekistan.
- Romanian defender **Flavius Stoican** has returned to training after missing several months because of injury. He had been recovering in Italy and has now been given an individual fitness programme. He is not registered for Shakhtar's group-stage campaign.
- Bielik revealed last week that his girlfriend Galina is due to give birth to a boy before the new year, and has also said the couple are planning on marriage.

Roma

- Christian Panucci is the most experienced UEFA Champions League campaigner in the Roma squad having played in his 57th match in the competition at home to AEK. Only Francesco Totti (24 appearances), Vincenzo Montella (21) and Cristian Chivu (17) have also got into double figures although David Pizarro and Simone Perrotta could both play in their tenth games in Donetsk.
- Montella made his 50th UEFA club competition appearance on Matchday 2; Totti has played in four more games while Panucci has appeared in 87 European matches.
- Only seven members of the Roma squad have scored in the UEFA Champions League, with **Totti** leading the way on nine goals, two more than **Panucci**. Totti needs one more goals to take his tally in UEFA club competition to 20.
- Doni, Rodrigo Defendi, Max Tonetto, Marco Cassetti, Taddei, Ricardo Faty, Aleandro Rosi, Mirko Vučinić and Stefano Okaka Chuka have all made their debuts in the competition proper this season.
- Vučinić took his bow in the competition against AEK at the Stadio Olimpico on Matchday 4.
- **Totti**'s goal against AEK on Matchday 4 took his tally for the competition this season to three goals, two fewer than top scorers Didier Drogba and Kaká.
- **Taddei** is one of eleven players who have set up two goals in the UEFA Champions League this season, with Juninho Pernambucano the leading assist provider with four.
- Totti has been caught offside 12 times so far, the most in the competition.
- Totti has also been fouled eleven times, three fewer than Ronaldinho and Shunsuke Nakamura.
- Roma's home ground, the Stadio Olimpico, will host the 2009 UEFA Champions League final.
- Tonetto celebrated his 32nd birthday on 18 November while Matteo Ferrari is 27 on 5 December.
- Roma were emphatic winners on Sunday, defeating Calcio Catania 7-0 in the Italian capital. **Panucci** began the scoring early on and Catania were reduced to ten men moments later as Giuseppe Mascara was sent off. **Perrotta** scored the second for the Giallorossi midway through the half and added another just before the break. Panucci also got his name on the scoresheet again shortly after the break before **Montella** and **Totti** completed the scoring against a Catania side that ended with nine men as Davide Baiocco was also dismissed.
- Coach Luciano Spalletti opted for his usual 4-2-3-1 formation for the match but was without **Tonetto** (thigh), instead fielding **Marco Cassetti** at right-back and moving **Panucci** over to the left. Spalletti also preferred **Ferrari** to **Philippe Mexes** as **Chivu**'s partner in central defence.

- Spalletti said: "We scored early in the game and everything became much easier for us when Catania only had ten men. That gave us space and we are very dangerous when we can run and use our pace. I'm very satisfied with our season so far and I now hope that we can seal qualification from the UEFA Champions League group stage and focus on the league for a while."
- Panucci was the 13th different player to score for Roma in their 12 Serie A games this season.
- The victory was Roma's fourth in succession in all competitions and extended their unbeaten run to nine matches.
- The win against Catania put Roma level with US Città di Palermo as the best attack in Serie A (26 goals), while they also have the best defence having conceded just eight times.
- The result was the first time a team had won 7-0 in Italy's top flight since Juventus defeated Ascoli Calcio 1898 by the same scoreline on 11 September 1983.
- It was Roma's biggest win since a 7-0 victory in the 2000/01 UEFA Cup against Slovenian side NK Gorica. Roma's record victory in Serie A is a 9-0 win against Cremonese US in 1929.
- Two goals by captain **Totti** gave Roma a 2-1 win at San Siro against AC Milan on 11 November. The Giallorossi forward volleyed an early opener from **Taddei**'s right-wing cross and, although Cristian Brocchi equalised, **Totti** gave Roma the win with a late header.
- "Milan caused us several problems in the first half," said coach **Spalletti**. "Then we grew in stature in the second half, especially after **Alberto Aquilani** replaced **Perrotta**, who was not in perfect condition after coming down with a virus the night before the match. **Totti** played very well, not only for the goals, but also for the way he kept the ball when he was alone in attack. **Doni** also played very well. He was calm between the posts and gave the whole team confidence."
- The victory, Roma's first away win against Milan for more than 20 years, was the club's 1,000th in Serie A.
- The victory was also Roma's fourth in five away games in Serie A this season.
- Roma coach **Spalletti** is keen to extend his contract, which expires at the end of the season, saying: "I'd certainly like to stay at Roma, there are no problems at all between me and the club. We just need to discuss the plans for the future. It doesn't really matter whether we do it now or in three months time."
- On 8 November Roma won 2-1 at Serie B side US Triestina Calcio in the first leg of the last 16 of the Coppa Italia. **Montella** scored at the end of the first half and at the beginning of the second. Lorenzo Rossetti scored for the home side in the closing stages.
- Spalletti rested Totti, Perrotta and Pizarro.
- "We played very well for most of the game and the victory is deserved," said **Spalletti**. "However, Triestina came back strongly towards the end and nearly equalised. I rested a few players and I wish I could have done the same with **Daniele De Rossi** but couldn't afford to. However, we are very satisfied with the result."
- Italian Under-21 goalkeeper **Gianluca Curci** made his first start of the season against Triestina, as did striker **Vučinić**, who has fully recovered from the knee injury he suffered in the summer.
- In the same game 19-year-old midfielder **Massimiliano Marsili** made his Roma debut, replacing **Vučinić** in the second half.

- The victory against Triestina came four days after an important 3-1 home win against ACF Fiorentina in Serie A. The visitors took the lead early on through Tomáš Ujfaluši but Roma drew level with a long-range right foot shot by **De Rossi**. **Taddei** then scored twice in the second half to secure the points.
- Spalletti was particularly happy with his side's second-half showing, saying: "We are still a young team and sometimes we get caught up in what the score is. **De Rossi**'s equaliser was crucial in this sense because our attitude changed completely after his goal. We then played well and it was an almost faultless performance in the second half considering the strong opposition."
- Aquilani was called up to the Italian national team for the first time after being promoted from the U21 side for the friendly against Turkey. He made his debut in the 1-1 draw in Bergamo on 15 November after replacing Brocchi in the second half. "It is a dream come true," he said. "But I hope it is just the beginning."
- **De Rossi** also featured for the Azzurri, coming coming off midway through the second half while **Perrotta** was not 100 per cent fit and stayed in Rome.
- Totti has asked for more time before returning to the Italian national team as he is still being troubled by the ankle injury that kept him on the sidelines for the second half of last season. The Roma captain is the club's leading scorer with four goals in Serie A and three in the UEFA Champions League.
- **Mexes** was included in the France squad for last Wednesday's friendly with Greece but was forced to withdraw after suffering a thigh injury against Milan.
- Chivu played for almost 90 minutes as Romania defeated Spain 1-0 in a friendly game in Cadiz.
- Goalkeeper Curci played for Italy's U21 team in the friendly against the Czech Republic in Frosinone. The game ended 0-0.
- French midfielder **Ricardo Faty** will be sidelined for around a month with a thigh injury. The 20-year-old has appeared four times in Serie A and once in the UEFA Champions League this season.

Competition facts

• UEFA Champions League: Group stage milestones

Olympique Lyonnais are on target for a record-breaking conclusion to their group-stage campaign in advance of their Matchday 5 trip to Real Madrid CF. They are two wins away from becoming only the fifth team – and the first since FC Barcelona in 2002/03 – to win all six games in a group stage. The first to manage it were AC Milan in the inaugural 1992/93 edition of the UEFA Champions League. Since then Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95) and FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) have matched the achievement, before that Barça success in the last season before the competition was revamped into its current format.

Unwanted record

Barcelona are not having such an easy ride this time around. A draw or defeat for the title-holders at PFC Levski Sofia and a Werder Bremen victory over Chelsea FC would make the Camp Nou side the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the four seasons that featured a second group stage between 1999/00 and 2002/03.)

Clean sheets

Lyon are also going for another UEFA Champions League first. No team has negotiated a group stage without conceding a goal but Lyon, along with FC Bayern München and PFC CSKA Moskva, could yet change that having managed four clean sheets to date. In contrast FC Dynamo Kyiv and Levski Sofia have both shipped 13 goals in their first four outings this term, just six short of the record number let in by Ferencvárosi TC in the 1995/96 campaign.

Shot shy

For all their defensive solidity, CSKA have only scored two goals so far. They can take comfort from the achievement of Villarreal CF last season and AS Roma in the 2002/03 first group stage, as both clubs advanced to the next phase with just three goals to their name. Villarreal are a particularly noteworthy example, as they made it all the way to the semi-finals in their debut campaign in the competition.

Seven enough

The good news for those who have made a slow start but are still in contention is that seven sides have successfully negotiated a group with only seven points. The first to do it were Legia Warszawa in 1995/96 before Bayer 04 Leverkusen managed it in 1999/00 and Liverpool FC in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat most recently achieved by Rangers FC and Bremen last term.

Freescoring United

The record for most goals scored in a group stage was established by Manchester United FC in 1998/99 when they found the net 20 times en route to lifting the trophy. It is a mark that is unlikely to be challenged this year, with the closest contenders being Spanish rivals Real Madrid CF and Valencia CF who have ten goals each to their name.

• UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

Domestic champions: This season's competition features 16 domestic league winners from last season, but none of the eight groups comprising the 2006/07 UEFA Champions League features four champions. Only Group A features three league winners from the last campaign with England, Spain and Bulgaria represented by their champions, namely Chelsea FC, FC Barcelona and PFC Levski Sofia. The fourth club in the group, Werder Bremen, finished second in last season's Bundesliga, five points behind FC Bayern München. All of the remaining groups feature two domestic league winners with the exception of Group H, where Belgian side RSC Anderlecht are the only champions. Group rivals AEK Athens FC were runners-up in Greece, while LOSC Lille Métropole and AC Milan were classified in third place in Ligue 1 and Serie A respectively. Alongside 16 champions, there are nine runners-up and six third-placed finishers. Arsenal FC are the only club in the group stage to have finished in fourth place in their domestic league championship last season.

Consecutive participations: This season, Manchester United FC have extended their consecutive participation in the UEFA Champions League to eleven, a record in the competition. Bayern, PSV Eindhoven, Olympiacos CFP and Real Madrid CF are making their tenth consecutive appearances, one ahead of Arsenal.

Knockout streak: In qualifying for the 2005/06 knockout phase, Real Madrid CF equalled Manchester United FC's record of nine consecutive seasons in advancing past the group stage. While United's streak came to an end last season, Madrid have featured in the knockout phase every time since the 1996/97 campaign. In those nine seasons, United won the competition once while they also advanced as far as the semi-finals twice, the quarter-finals four times and the first knockout round twice in the other eight seasons. Madrid, meanwhile, have won the competition three times in the last nine years while they advanced as far as the semi-finals twice and the quarter-finals twice. However, in the last two seasons their interest in the competition has ended at the first knockout round.

European return: Of all 32 clubs competing in this season's UEFA Champions League, only FC Spartak Moskva and FC Girondins de Bordeaux did not participate in a UEFA club competition during the 2005/06 season. Indeed, the two clubs are making their first appearance in UEFA club competition since the 2003/04 season.

Past masters: Four clubs competing in the 2006/07 UEFA Champions League were involved in the competition when it started during the 1992/93 season. AC Milan were beaten finalists (losing to Olympique de Marseille), while PSV Eindhoven, PFC CSKA Moskva and FC Porto all participated in the group stage. In addition, AEK Athens FC and FC Barcelona were knocked out in the second round, the last hurdle before the group stage.

Long road for debutants: Five clubs have advanced to the group stage from the European Champion Clubs' Cup second qualifying round including this season's two debutants, FC København and PFC Levski Sofia. They are joined by FC Spartak Moskva, FC Dynamo Kyiv and FC Steaua Bucuresti as clubs who had to play four matches to claim their place in the group stage of the competition. A debutant has not won the competition since Juventus in 1995/96, the Italian side becoming the third club to achieve this following Olympique de Marseille (1992/93, first UEFA Champions League final) and AFC Ajax (1994/95).

No qualifiers: Of the 32 clubs involved in the group stage, only AS Roma and FC Girondins de Bordeaux have yet to play a qualifying round match in order to reach the UEFA Champions League. Roma are making their fourth appearance in the competition, while Bordeaux are involved for the second time.

Pedigree: Four of the former winners of the competition since it included a group stage element from the 1992/93 season are not participating in this season's UEFA Champions League, namely Olympique de Marseille (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1994/95), Juventus (1995/96) and BV Borussia Dortmund (1996/97). The last ten winners of the competition, Real Madrid CF (three), Manchester United FC, FC Bayern München, AC Milan, FC Porto, Liverpool FC and FC Barcelona are involved in this season's group stage. Only three winners from the last ten UEFA Cup finals are not involved in this season's UEFA Champions League group stage, namely Parma FC (1998/99), Feyenoord (2001/02) and Sevilla FC (2005/06). Liverpool and Porto have won both competitions in the past decade, while the remaining UEFA Cup winners in that time are FC Internazionale Milano, Galatasaray SK, Valencia CF and PFC CSKA Moskva.

Chygrynskiy wants Roma challenge

FC Shakhtar Donetsk starlet Dmytro Chygrynskiy is used to facing stiff challenges and is unfazed by the prospect of coming up against a rampant AS Roma tonight.

Win required

The Italian club were 7-0 winners in Serie A against Calcio Catania at the weekend and began this season's UEFA Champions League campaign with a 4-0 home victory against Shakhtar on Matchday 1. In the return fixture, Chygrynskiy must help the Ukrainian outfit get the win they need to keep their qualification dream alive. With Valencia CF already qualified on ten points, Shakhtar find themselves five points adrift of second-placed Roma with two games to play.

Eager for more

It is another big night in what has been a memorable year for Chygrynskiy. After helping Shakhtar to the domestic title, he played every minute as Ukraine reached the UEFA European Under-21 Championship final and then went with the senior squad to the 2006 FIFA World Cup. He is eager for more and is desperate to get as much European experience as he can. Should Roma take at least a point this evening, then Shakhtar will at least have the consolation of a Matchday 6 showdown with Olympiacos CFP for a UEFA Cup spot.

Strong defence

For now, however, all thoughts are on the UEFA Champions League. Despite the visit of in-form Francesco Totti, Mancini and Co, the 20-year-old Chygrynskiy believes his side have what it takes to contain such attacking intent. "How to handle Totti and Mancini? This is a question not only for the defenders, but also for the coach," he said. "A lot depends on what strategy and tactics we adopt for the match. We need to stop them having the ball and play a pressing game.

Positive approach

"We should not pay too much attention to what happened on Matchday 1," he added. "In every UEFA Champions League match with exception of the game at Valencia [when Shakhtar lost 2-0 on Matchday 3] we have tried to dictate the course of play and showed good football." While he admitted that such a positive approach has not yet reaped its rewards, he believed it was only a matter of time before the tide turned. "We have a definite plan and strategy to win, regardless of our opponents," he said.

UEFA information

Puskás remembered

Hungarian and European football mourned the loss of an all-time great on Friday when Ferenc Puskás died in Budapest at the age of 79 after a long illness. Puskás won league titles in his homeland with Kispest Honvéd FC and in Spain with Real Madrid CF, with whom he also lifted the European Champion Clubs' Cup, memorably scoring four goals in the 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt in 1960. On the international stage, Puskás and his Hungary team-mates captured gold at the 1952 Olympic Games and followed that up with victories such as the 6-3 defeat of England at Wembley on 25 November 1953.

UEFA President Lennart Johansson said: "I knew about his illness and thought that I was prepared to receive the ultimate bad news. But I wasn't. Realisation that I will never see Ferenc Puskás again gives me a sense of emptiness that, I am sure, a lot of other people are experiencing. The footballer had long since become a legend. With that left foot which could be velvet or pure steel, he broke all sorts of records. He went into the annals of UEFA as the only player to have scored four goals and the only one to record two hat-tricks in European finals.

"Behind the remarkable statistics was a remarkable man. In his humble way, he would deny that he had a profound influence on the development of European football. But he did. What's more, his career and his life held a mirror to the history of our continent... Ferenc Puskás once said that he loved football more than he loved life. Sadly, his life is now over. But football will never stop loving Ferenc Puskás."

Athens design

UEFA has unveiled the new visual identity created for the 2007 UEFA Champions League final in Athens at a special ceremony in the Greek capital. The event design to be used around the UEFA Champions League final at Athens's Olympic Stadium on 23 May was revealed at the Ceremonies Hall within the City Hall in Kotzia Square on 9 November. The UEFA Champions League final has, in recent years, been given an identity of its own with a unique logo, a design concept and an overall theme. The objective is to help promote the final and enhance the prestige of one of the world's biggest sporting events.

Independent European Sports Review

European law has continued to have a major impact on sport in recent years, although the cases are less celebrated than the 1995 Bosman case that drastically altered football. One of these was the Meca-Medina case, in which judgement was handed down by the European Court of Justice in a case involving two swimmers who had failed a doping test.

In a summary article and longer background essay, published on uefa.com, UEFA's director of legal affairs Gianni Infantino looks at this case and related questions, especially in view of the findings of the newly-published Independent European Sports Review. The review supports recognition of sport's specific nature in European Union legislation, and the preservation and protection of the present European sports model, and asks if the Meca-Medina verdict is a step backwards for the European sports model and sports specificity.

Mircea Lucescu is one of the biggest personalities, and one of the greatest coaches, Romania has produced. He joined FC Dinamo 1948 Bucuresti in 1963, making his top-flight debut the following year. After spending two seasons in the second division with FC Stiinta Bucuresti Lucescu returned to Dinamo and stayed another decade, winning five championships and the Romanian Cup. Lucescu represented his country 70 times, scoring nine goals and appearing at the 1970 FIFA World Cup.

He was appointed player-coach of FC Corvinul Hunedoara in 1977 before hanging up his boots after 362 first division appearances and 78 goals. As a coach his style has involved rebuilding teams, improving players who appeared to be the finished article, and he took over as coach of Romania in 1981, becoming their technical director a year later.

In 1986, he returned to Dinamo as coach and guided them to a league title and cup win as well as the 1989/90 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup semi-finals. A workaholic who speaks six foreign languages, Lucescu then had spells in charge of Italian sides Pisa Calcio, Brescia Calcio, Reggiana AC and FC Internazionale Milano. After returning to Romania and leading AFC Rapid Bucuresti to their first title for 32 years in 1999, he moved to Turkey's Galatasaray SK, where he was a league winner and also got his hands on the UEFA Super Cup in 2000. After another title with Beşiktaş JK he took charge of FC Shakhtar Donetsk in 2004, winning the Ukrainian Premier League title in his first two seasons.

Luciano Spalletti

A hard-working midfielder in his playing days, Luciano Spalletti has kept the same mentality since starting his coaching career in 1993/94 at his former club Empoli FC. Spalletti enjoyed immediate success with successive promotions. In his first full season at the helm, he led the side from Tuscany to Serie B before taking them to Serie A the following campaign. After a good first term in top-flight football, Spalletti left to join the more ambitious UC Sampdoria but his spell at the Luigi Ferraris stadium ended abruptly with his sacking after 28 games of the 1998/99 season. It was the beginning of a difficult period for Spalletti who had incomplete stays at Venezia Calcio, Udinese Calcio and Ancona Calcio before returning to Udinese to bring his career back on track ahead of the 2002/03 campaign.

Spalletti steered Udinese to sixth and seventh-placed finishes before writing his name into the club's history as the first coach to guide Udinese to UEFA Champions League football with a fourth place in 2004/05. That June, however, Spalletti answered a call from AS Roma, who had avoided relegation on the last day of term and had been struggling to fill the gap left by Fabio Capello. He signed a two-year contract.

After a difficult opening to 2005/06, Spalletti managed to gain the faith of the Roma squad. Without injured captain Francesco Totti, Roma set a record of consecutive Serie A wins (eleven) and came fifth before the Italian match-fixing tribunal punished Juventus, AC Milan and ACF Fiorentina. That resulted in the Giallorossi moving up to second, earning them an automatic group-stage place in the UEFA Champions League.

Wolfgang Stark's ambition is to follow in the footsteps of compatriot Markus Merk and reach the top of the European refereeing tree. Hailing from Landshut in Bavaria, bank employee Stark has been a German Football Association referee since 1994. He took charge of 53 matches in the 2. Bundesliga before stepping up to the top flight in 1997. Two years later he became a FIFA official, overseeing his first international in March 2001 - a goalless draw between Azerbaijan and Moldova.

Two early career highlights came in 1999 when he was selected to travel to the FIFA U-17 World Cup in New Zealand and the UEFA European Under-18 Championship in Sweden. Stark also spent a valuable month refereeing in Japan's J-League in September 2001. Stark was a regular in 2006 FIFA World Cup qualifying - ending the qualification round by overseeing the France-Cyprus tie.

Stark has been in the middle for top domestic fixtures too, with Bayer 04 Leverkusen's match with FC Schalke 04 in 2004 among his personal favourites to date. Other key games he has overseen include England's FIFA World Cup qualifying win against Northern Ireland in Manchester in March 2005, and Olympique Lyonnais' 2-2 group-stage tussle with Manchester United FC in the 2004/05 UEFA Champions League. In the 2005/06 campaign, he was the man in the middle for four UEFA Champions League fixtures including the first knockout round first-leg duel between AFC Ajax and FC Internazionale Milano.

Competition information

UEFA's most prestigious club competition was originally created as the European Champion Clubs' Cup for the 1955/56 season, before its revamping as the UEFA Champions League in 1992.

• Locally-trained players rule: In February 2005, UEFA announced that the 'A' list that teams submit for UEFA club competitions will continue to be limited to 25 players, and from season 2006/07, at least four places on this list will be reserved for players trained by the club's own football academy of which half can be players trained by other clubs from within the same association of the said club.

The 'B' list will also continue to exist - involving an unlimited number of Under-21 players who have been at the club for two seasons. In 2007/08, the number of locally-trained players in a squad will increase to six before rising to eight in 2008/09, with up to half of each figure allowed to be association trained.

A club-trained player is defined as a player who has been registered for a minimum of three seasons with the club between the age of 15 and 21, whereas an association-trained player is one who has been registered for at least three seasons by the club or by other clubs affiliated to the same association between the age of 15 and 21.

UEFA is concerned some clubs are not training enough of their own players, but simply taking them from elsewhere. The proposed measures have the objective of creating a better balance in domestic competitions, preventing clubs from simply 'hoarding' players in squads and creating a system whereby locally-trained players would be given a greater opportunity to play regularly in club sides - ensuring a large reservoir of talent for national teams as a consequence.

• Financial information: UEFA says the estimated budgeted income for the 2006/07 UEFA Champions League is €750m – higher than the 2005/06 campaign revenue which amounted to CHF943m (approx. €610m).

Under the competition regulations, 75 per cent of the total revenue received from television and commercial contracts concluded by UEFA, up to a maximum of €530m will go to the 32 clubs taking part in the group stage of Europe's premier club competition. The remaining 25 per cent is earmarked for European football and remains with UEFA to cover organisational and administrative costs, as well as for solidarity payments to associations, clubs and leagues.

It is also stipulated that participating clubs will receive 82 per cent of any revenue received from the same stream in excess of € 530m, with the remaining 18 per cent allocated to UEFA for European football. In addition, 50 per cent of the revenue received from new media contracts concluded by UEFA will also be available for distribution to the clubs, and the remaining 50 per cent will be allocated to the above-mentioned European football portion/quota.

The gross income for 2006/07 is estimated at €750m, and according to projections, will be made up of € 743.3m from TV and commercial contracts and €6.7m from new media contracts.

The fixed amount to the clubs is €276.6m. Each of the 32 clubs in the group stage will receive a starting bonus of €2m. In addition, they will receive a match bonus of €400,000 per match. Performance bonuses will amount to €600,000 for a win and €300,000 for a draw in the group stage. The 16 teams playing in the first knockout round will receive €2.2m, the eight quarter-finalists €2.5m each and the four semi-finalists €3m each. The UEFA Champions League winners will receive €7m, and the runners-up €4m.

This means that a total minimum amount of €4.4m per club is guaranteed for the group stage. A club could receive, at best, up to €22.7m, not counting the market pool share and gate receipts.

The remaining €270.4m will be distributed according to the proportional value of each TV market represented by the clubs taking part in the UEFA Champions League, and to be split among the number of teams – four, three, two or one – participating from a given association.

- Format: The UEFA Champions League group stage draw in Monaco on 24 August saw the 32 teams divided into eight groups of four. Clubs from the same association could not be drawn into the same group. Each club plays one home and one away match against each other club in its group. Three points are awarded for a win, one point for a draw and no points for a defeat. If two or more teams are equal on points on completion of the group matches, the following criteria are applied to determine the rankings.
- a) higher number of points obtained in the group matches played among the teams in question;
- b) superior goal difference from the group matches played among the teams in question;
- c) higher number of goals scored away from home in the group matches played among the teams in question;
- d) superior goal difference from all group matches played;
- e) higher number of goals scored;
- f) higher number of coefficient points accumulated by the club in question as well as its association, over the previous five seasons.

The eight group-winners and eight runners-up of the group stage qualify for the first knockout round, to be played over two legs on 20 February and 7 March 2007. The clubs that finish this stage in third position in their group move into the round of 32 of the UEFA Cup. The clubs that finish this stage in fourth position in their group are eliminated from UEFA club competition for the season.

- **Deadlines:** UEFA Champions League matchday stats packs and match-by-match press kits are provided to media by uefa.com. For every matchday, a global stats pack is created and issued once matches from the previous matchday have been completed and the data verified. For every UEFA Champions League match, two press kits are issued in English: Sunday at 22:00CET with a match preview update on Monday at 22:00CET for Tuesday's matches. For Wednesday's matches, the press kit is issued on Monday at 22:00CET with the match preview update version published on Tuesday at 22:00CET. Multilingual versions of press kits, determined on a match-by-match basis, are also issued with similar deadlines.
