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INTRODUCTION

Pastoral Care Companion

The Pastoral Care Companion contains all the rites and blessings from the Lutheran Service Book: Agenda that the pastor will need for pastoral care outside of the chancel and nave. Overviews and extensive notes on each of these rites are provided in the main Agenda. In addition to these "traveling rites," the Pastoral Care Companion also contains Resources for Pastoral Care that cover a wide range of issues that a pastor may encounter in ministering to individual members of his congregation. Each section of resources includes an introductory paragraph that gives the pastor suggestions on how to minister Law and Gospel to the people or person in that particular crisis or need. There is also resource material that assists the pastor in leading his members through various occasions of celebrations or difficult challenges. Each section includes psalms, readings, hymn stanzas, and prayers appropriate to the particular topic. The principal psalms and readings are printed out for easy reference. Additional psalms and readings are listed with short sentences describing their content. These resources are not intended to be exhaustive, nor are they intended to be used in a wooden or artificial way. Rather, they are intended, as their name suggests, to be resources for the pastor in caring for his flock.

The Pastor's Preparation for Pastoral Care

The best preparation for pastoral care is the pastor's own faithful hearing of the Word of God and praying of the Psalter. The discipline

of praying through the Psalter regularly and reading through the Scriptures annually, coupled with daily meditation and study of the Word of God, the Small Catechism, and the Lutheran Confessions, strengthens the pastor's own faith and grounds him in the language of God's Word for the faithful ministration of his office. It is also advisable for the pastor to have a father confessor of his own from whom he receives absolution and counsel from God's Word on a regular basis. Pastors who offer private confession and absolution to their flocks will desire to receive the same ministry for themselves so that their office and faith is firmly anchored in the Gospel of Christ. A section of prayers for the pastor in preparation for various facets of his ministry is provided below (pages xviii–xxviii).

The Use of Scripture in Pastoral Care

In making visits to those who are hospitalized, homebound, or confined to a nursing home, the pastor might well use selected readings for the appointed Sunday from the lectionary. In this way the member is reminded of his connection to the congregation. This also provides an opportunity for the pastor to reflect on the texts on which he will be preaching in light of the needs and afflictions of the flock committed to his care.

The *Pastoral Care Companion* provides a wealth of psalms and biblical texts for a variety of situations and circumstances (e.g., chronic illness, facing diagnosis, before surgery, after childbirth). Here the pastor is advised to be prepared to select readings that are appropriate to the circumstances of the visit. In some instances, longer or multiple readings may be helpful. In other cases, such as the care of a person under heavy medication or in an intensive care unit, the pastor may best serve the individual by reading, or repeating from memory, short texts from Holy Scripture that are easily heard and remembered. God's Word brings comfort to Christians. Pastors will use it carefully so that those who hear it may cling to God's promises and find comfort in life and death.

Praying the Psalms

Psalms give voice to the praise of God in the depths of affliction and in the heights of human joy. We have confidence in praying the psalms for in the Psalter we are praying God's own words. They are put there, says Luther, for us. "Hence it is that the Psalter is the book of all saints; and everyone, in whatever situation he may be, finds in that situation psalms and words that fit his case, that suit him as if they were put there just for his sake, so that he could not put it better himself, or find or wish for anything better" (*Preface to the Psalter*. AE 35:256).

The Use of Prayer in Pastoral Care

Collects tested and tried by long usage in the Church as well as new collects included in this resource provide the pastor with "readymade prayers" for a variety of difficult situations. Whenever possible, it will be helpful to review the prayers in advance in order to select those that are best suited to the situation. These prayers, by both their structure and content, shape the pastor's *ex corde* prayers as he ministers to his people. As such, the pastor will modify and adjust these prayers along with others he might pray in order to fit the needs of a particular situation. The traditional structure of the collect (address, rationale, petition, benefit, and termination) can be a helpful template for the pastor as he prays in many informal situations of intimate pastoral conversation. Words and phrases from the Psalms, the liturgy, and hymns will emerge in these prayers as the pastor himself lives in and from these texts.

Using the Pastoral Care Companion

This companion is intended to provide resources for the pastor and other spiritual caregivers in a variety of situations. The following may especially be noted:

Eighteen rites from the LSB Agenda are included in this volume.
 These were chosen because of the likelihood that they might be conducted outside of the church building.

- Seasonal Proper Prefaces for use with the Communion of the Sick and Homebound are provided immediately following that service (pages 49–55).
- Scripture readings, prayers, and other helps are provided for more than sixty different spiritual care situations. The topics have been carefully arranged in the table of contents under eight different headings. A Topical Index (pages 704–707) is also provided to assist in locating a particular topic.
- All of the collects and readings for both the three-year and oneyear lectionaries are included for handy reference (pages 537–616).
- Over 120 additional prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings are provided (pages 617–650). These have been drawn from the more extensive collection in the *LSB Altar Book*. All of the prayers in this volume are referenced in the Topical Index of Prayers (pages 683–702).
- Selected liturgical and hymn texts in both German and Spanish have been provided (pages 651–656).
- The Preparation for Confession (pages 657–663) may be used by the pastor as he ministers to those who come to Individual Confession and Absolution.
- Guidelines for Pastoral Examination of Catechumens (pages 664–671) may be used by the pastor as he prepares and examines confirmands for admission to the Lord's Supper.
- A Scripture Index (pages 677–682) of over 400 Bible passages appearing in this volume will assist the user in finding a particular text.

While the *Pastoral Care Companion* is designed primarily to assist the pastor in caring for the souls of others, he will also find that it has much to offer for his own spiritual care and nourishment. In addition to the many texts and prayers that he will share with others in a variety of circumstances, there is also a collection of prayers intended for the pastor to use prior to ministering to members of his flock (pages xviii–xxviii).

PASTOR'S PRAYERS OF PREPARATION

GENERAL

Luther's sacristy prayer

O Lord God, dear Father in heaven, I am indeed unworthy of the office and ministry in which I am to make known Your glory and to nurture and to serve this congregation.

But since You have appointed me to be a pastor and teacher, and the people are in need of the teaching and the instruction, be my helper and let Your holy angels attend me.

Then if You are pleased to accomplish anything through me, to Your glory and not to mine or to the praise of men, grant me, out of Your pure grace and mercy, a right understanding of Your Word and that I may also diligently perform it.

O Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God, shepherd and bishop of our souls, send Your Holy Spirit that He may work with me to will and to do through Your divine strength according to Your good pleasure. Amen. (701)

Prayer for faithfulness

Almighty God, heavenly Father, You have called me into the work of Your vineyard and lavished upon me Your grace and all manner of spiritual and eternal gifts. Help me to live unto You in humility and patience, to hope in Your pure grace and faithfulness, to abide in Your house, and to praise and magnify Your glorious grace forever; through Christ, our Lord. Amen. (702)



- 1. This rite is for use with baptized Christians who are sick or infirm.
- 2. An option for receiving Holy Communion is provided in the rite. For repeated visits to the sick and homebound, the Communion of the Sick and Homebound (page 39) may be used.
- 3. According to apostolic custom (Mark 6:13; James 5:14), a sick person may be anointed with oil as a reminder of the grace of God given by the Holy Spirit in Holy Baptism. Olive oil is used when anointing the sick.
- 4. If Individual Confession and Absolution is desired, the penitent may follow along in the pew edition of *Lutheran Service Book* (pages 292–293). If a pew book is not available, the pastor may share his copy with the penitent.
- 5. See pages 195–233 for appropriate Scripture resources.

As he enters the house or room, the pastor speaks this greeting:

Peace be to this house (place).

Luke 10:5

Amen.

The pastor may read an appropriate portion of Holy Scripture according to the circumstance. He will then instruct the person patiently to trust God's holy will, confident that, according to His gracious promise, in all things He works for the good of those who love Him. The pastor may also sing an appropriate hymn.

The confession of sins may follow one of the forms below. In the case of individual confession, the pastor assures the confidentiality of the confession by requesting others present to leave the room or by taking other appropriate measures.

General Confession

O almighty God, merciful Father, I, a poor, miserable sinner, confess unto You all my sins and iniquities with which I have ever offended You and justly deserved Your temporal and eternal punishment. But I am heartily sorry for them and sincerely repent of them, and I pray You of Your boundless mercy and for the sake of the holy, innocent, bitter sufferings and death of Your beloved Son, Jesus Christ, to be gracious and merciful to me, a poor, sinful being.

OR

Individual Confession

Pastor, please hear my confession and pronounce forgiveness in order to fulfill God's will. Proceed.

I, a poor sinner, plead guilty before God of all sins. I have lived as if God did not matter and as if I mattered most. My Lord's name I have not honored as I should; my worship and prayers have faltered. I have not let His love have its way with me, and so my love for others has failed. There

What troubles me particularly is that ...

The penitent confesses whatever he has done against the commandments of God, according to his place in life. Then he concludes by saying:

I am sorry for all of this and ask for grace. I want to do better.

God be merciful to you and strengthen your faith. **Amen.**

Do you believe that my forgiveness is God's forgiveness? **Yes.**

Do you believe that our Lord Jesus Christ died for you and shed His blood for you on the cross for the forgiveness of all your sins?

Yes.

Do you pray God, for the sake of the holy, innocent, bitter sufferings and death of His beloved Son, to be gracious and merciful to you?

Yes.

Finally, do you believe that my forgiveness is God's forgiveness?

Yes.

Let it be done for you as you believe.

The pastor places his hands on the head of the penitent and says:

In the stead and by the command of my Lord Jesus Christ I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Amen.

When Individual Confession and Absolution is concluded, the pastor invites the family and loved ones to return.

When a sick person is to be anointed with oil, the following passage from Holy Scripture is read:

Is anyone among you sick? Let him call for the elders¹ of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer of faith will save the one who is sick, and the Lord will raise him up. And if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven. Therefore, confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The effective prayer of a righteous person has great power.

James 5:14-16

¹The Greek word for "elders," *presbyteroi*, in the reading from James refers to pastors and not lay elders.

<u>Name</u>, you have confessed your sins and received Holy Absolution. In remembrance of the grace of God given by the Holy Spirit in the waters of Holy Baptism, I will anoint you with oil. Confident in our Lord and in love for you, we also pray for you that you will not lose faith. Know that in godly patience the Church endures with you and supports you during this affliction. We firmly believe that this illness is for the glory of God and that the Lord will both hear our prayer and work according to His good and gracious will.

Using his right thumb, the pastor anoints the sick person on the forehead while saying:

Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has given you the new birth of water and the Spirit and has forgiven you all your sins, strengthen you with His grace to life + everlasting.

Amen.



Times of Illness

Pastoral visitation during an illness may be a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for ministry to a particular individual. The pastor will want to remind the person that Christ has carried all of our sicknesses and infirmities. In this light, the afflicted are rightly invited to cling to Christ and His cross and receive His salvation delivered in the Gospel and the blessed Sacraments.

Father of mercies and God of all comfort, our only help in time of need, look with favor upon Your servant(s) __name(s)__. Assure __him/her/them__ of Your mercy, comfort __him/her/them__ with the awareness of Your goodness, preserve __him/her/them__ from the temptations of the evil one, and give __him/her/them__ patience in __his/her/their_ tribulation. If it please You, restore __him/her/them__ to health, or give __him/her/them__ grace to accept this affliction; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (254 alt.)

Lord God, the strength of the weak and the consolation of those who suffer, mercifully hear our prayers, and grant to <u>name</u> the help of Your power, that <u>his/her</u> sickness may be turned to health and our sorrow into joy; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (750)

Father of all mercy, You never fail to help those who call on You for help. Give strength and confidence to Your <u>son/daughter</u> in <u>his/her</u> time of great need that <u>he/she</u> may know that You are near and that You uphold <u>him/her</u> with Your everlasting arms. Grant that, resting on Your protection, <u>he/she</u> may fear no evil, for You are with <u>him/her</u> to comfort and deliver <u>him/her</u>; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (751)

Heavenly Father, You forgive all our iniquities and heal all our diseases. You sent Your only-begotten Son to bear our griefs and carry our sorrows. Be merciful to <u>name</u>, pardon all <u>his/her</u> sins, and restore <u>his/her</u> health according to Your will. Preserve <u>his/her</u> faith, and keep <u>him/her</u> and <u>his/her</u> family in Your peace and safety; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (752)

Critical illness

O Lord, You are the great Physician of soul and body; You chasten and You heal. Show mercy to Your servant(s) __name(s)__. Spare __his/her/their__ life (lives) and restore __his/her/their__ strength. Even as You gave Your Son to bear our infirmities and sicknesses, deal compassionately with __name(s)__ and bless __him/her/them__ with Your healing power. We commit __him/her/them__ to Your gracious mercy and protection; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (255)

Emergency

Almighty God, our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble, look in mercy upon <u>name</u> in <u>his/her</u> time of great need. Sustain <u>his/her</u> faith and defend <u>him/her</u> from every danger to body and soul. Grant <u>him/her</u> the certainty that, upholding <u>him/her</u> with Your everlasting arms, You are at work for <u>his/her</u> good and for the honor and glory of Your name; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (753)

For a critically ill child

Almighty God, Father in heaven, watch over Your child <u>name</u> now afflicted with sickness. Mercifully spare the life You have given. Relieve <u>his/her</u> pain, guard <u>him/her</u> from all danger, and restore

<u>his/her</u> health according to Your gracious will, that <u>he/she</u> may be raised to a life of faithful service to You; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (258)

Praying with a young child

When praying with a young child, the pastor may also pray in simple language such as the following:

Dear Jesus, <u>name</u> is <u>hurting/sick</u>. We know that You love <u>him/her</u>. Watch over <u>him/her</u> and help <u>him/her</u> to get better; in Your name we pray. (754)

Before medical testing

Almighty God, graciously comfort <u>name</u> in <u>his/her</u> suffering, and be with <u>him/her</u> as <u>he/she</u> undergoes medical testing. Take away <u>his/her</u> fear, and strengthen <u>his/her</u> faith that <u>he/she</u> may trust in Your merciful will and cling to Your salvation; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (755)

After medical testing

Lord God, heavenly Father, receive our humble thanks for protecting name during his/her medical test/procedure. Graciously keep him/her in Your love and care, granting him/her patience and trust, for we know that whoever believes in Christ will not be forsaken; through the same Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (756)

Before surgery

Lord Jesus Christ, in Your ministry You healed many with frail and diseased bodies. Be present with <u>name</u> as <u>he/she</u> undergoes surgery. Bless <u>him/her</u> with faith in Your loving-kindness and **>**

protection. Endow the surgeon(s) and the medical team with skill and alertness so that this surgery may help Your servant to a speedy restoration of health and strength according to Your gracious will. Hear us for Your name's sake as you live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (757)

After surgery

Lord Jesus Christ, receive our thanks for hearing our prayers on behalf of <u>name</u>, who has successfully undergone surgery, and for giving to the surgeon(s) and the medical team the skills that have been effectually administered. Restore <u>him/her</u> fully to health and strength, in Your time and according to Your good and gracious will; for You live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (758)

At the time of diagnosis

Almighty God, merciful Lord, our times are in Your hand. Look in favor on <u>name</u>, whose illness has been diagnosed and for whose healing we humbly pray. Sustain <u>him/her</u> by Your grace that <u>his/her</u> patience and hope may not fail. Calm all fear and anxiety in <u>him/her</u> and in <u>his/her</u> loved ones, and grant them faith to accept Your will and firmly believe that what You ordain is always good; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (759)

For doctors, surgeons, nurses, and other medical personnel

Lord God, be with the doctors and nurses and all others who will be ministering to the bodily needs of Your servant <u>name</u> that, blessed by You, their tender care may serve to the healing of <u>his/her</u> sickness and lead to a speedy return to health; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (760)

When parents have played a supportive role in reaching this milestone, the pastor will want to recognize their unique contribution also.

"Confession has two parts: first, that we confess our sins, and second, that we receive absolution, that is, forgiveness, from the pastor as from God Himself" (Small Catechism).

Confession may be preceded by a candid examination of one's actions, motives, and nature (1 Cor. 11:28). This examination leads the penitent to speak the truth before the Lord. Like a mirror, these questions are designed to reflect the truth about one's sin in the light of the Law (James 1:22–25). They expose not merely sins, but that "by nature [we] do not possess true fear of God and true faith in God" (AC II, 2). In this way, they encourage serious, thoughtful, and truthful self-examination so that the Christian may heartily and sincerely confess, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner" (Luke 18:13). Not all questions may apply every time, nor are they exhaustive.

Absolution strengthens the faith of the penitent, comforts the conscience, and gives courage to confess sins and sinfulness. Most importantly, it declares that the Lord keeps no record of sin, that there is forgiveness with Him, that He removes our transgressions from us and remembers our sin no more (Ps. 130:3–4: 103:12; Jer. 31:34).

The following questions may be used by the pastor in his own self-examination in preparing to confess his sins. He may also adapt and use the questions to assist penitents who come to confession. He will always want to keep in mind the guidance provided in the rite of Individual Confession and Absolution that his questions and instruction are not meant to "pry or judge," but to assist the penitent in his or her own self-examination.

The First Commandment

You shall have no other gods.

What does this mean?

We should fear, love, and trust in God above all things.

In what or whom do I trust above all else?

In what or whom do I trust most for financial security, physical safety, or emotional support?

Do I fear God's wrath, avoiding every sin?

Is my love for and trust in God evident in my daily living?

Do I expect only good from God in every situation, or do I worry, doubt, complain, or feel unfairly treated when things go wrong?

Do I withhold from God what is rightfully His?

The Second Commandment

You shall not misuse the name of the Lord your God.

What does this mean?

We should fear and love God so that we do not curse, swear, use satanic arts, lie, or deceive by His name, but call upon it in every trouble, pray, praise, and give thanks.

Is the Lord's Word evident in my daily speech and conduct, or do I curse, speak carelessly, or misuse God's name?

Do I keep all the vows I have made in the Lord's name, such as confirmation, marriage, or legal vows, etc.?

Am I diligent and sincere in my prayers, or have I been lazy, bored, or distracted? Do I trust that the Lord God will answer them according to His good and gracious will?



GUIDELINES FOR PASTORAL EXAMINATION OF CATECHUMENS

Before the Rite of First Communion or Before the Rite of Confirmation

Explanation of the Guidelines

Examining catechumens in the faith prior to admission to the Lord's Supper or confirmation is an important responsibility of the parish pastor. For both first communion and confirmation, candidates have learned the Ten Commandments, the Creed, and the Lord's Prayer. They have received careful instruction in the Gospel and Sacraments. Confessing their sin and trusting in their Savior, they desire to receive the Lord's Supper for the forgiveness of sins and the strengthening of their faith in Christ and in love toward others. These are the overarching concerns for the pastor in the pastoral examination of these candidates. Concerning the worthy reception of the Lord's Supper, the Small Catechism teaches: "That person is truly worthy and well prepared who has faith in these words: 'Given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins.' But anyone who does not believe these words or doubts them is unworthy and unprepared, for the words 'for you' require all hearts to believe." On the basis of this, baptized Christians are admitted to the Sacrament when they have been examined and absolved by their pastor in accordance with the practice outlined in the Augsburg Confession (Article XXV). When confirmation is separated from first communion, confirmation especially highlights that a catechumen has received more thorough instruction in the faith than he received prior to first communion.

The questions and answers provided in these guidelines are intended to be used conversationally, not in a rigid or formalistic manner. The pastor should feel free to adapt and adjust the questions according to the responses of the candidate and how the conversation develops. In most cases, the pastor will already be quite familiar with a candidate's confession of faith because of his contact with him in catechesis. For this reason, an examination need not cover all of Christian doctrine. As a matter of pastoral judgment, however, a pastor may wish to include additional questions that are not covered in this outline. The outline of questions in these guidelines has been shaped largely by "Christian Questions with Their Answers" from the Small Catechism. Most important to note is the recurring theme, "How do you know this?" Faith knows and confesses what is true on the basis of the Word of God. This is one of the reasons why the salutary practice of learning by heart the text of the Small Catechism has been retained.

In the case of a child, it is desirable that parents be present for the examination; as appropriate, a child's sponsors may also be present. The candidate's home or the pastor's study may be the best location to facilitate a relaxed conversation with the catechumen. When a pastor has many catechumens to examine in preparation for either first communion or confirmation, he may reserve a review of the respective rite for a time when he can gather all the candidates together. Answers are provided for each question as a general guide to the pastor as to the type of responses he should expect. Pastors should see the examination conversation as another opportunity to catechize and firmly anchor a catechumen's faith in the Word of God. Examination of one's confession does not automatically admit a person to the Lord's Table or result in confirmation. In some cases pastor and parents or sponsors might determine that further catechesis is warranted.

Prayer before beginning the examination

Lord God, heavenly Father, in Holy Baptism You began Your good work in <u>name</u>, forgiving <u>him/her</u> all sin and giving <u>him/her</u> the gift of the Holy Spirit and faith in Your Son. You have also blessed <u>his/her</u> instruction in the Word of God. Be with us now in our conversation together, that <u>he/she</u> may faithfully confess <u>his/her</u> Savior Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. (881)

Examination Questions and Answers

Do you know the Ten Commandments? What are they?

You shall have no other gods.

You shall not misuse the name of the Lord your God.
